Dana L. Lemon, Lorene M. Lindsey, Kay H. Pippin and Marcia G. Taylor will be featured for their career and civic contributions at the Power of Women event at HMC. The day's agenda will also include a women's health fair featuring bone density screenings, yoga and fitness demonstrations, mas-

sage therapy, cholesterol and glucose testing, migraine screenings, financial planning for women, stress therapy, beauty makeovers, body fat analysis, blood pressure screenings, breast cancer risk assessment, irritable bowel syndrome information and other activities.

This fair will benefit Haven House, Henry County's domestic violence shelter for women. Participants are asked to bring a donation of a personal hygiene product such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste or deodorant.

Almost all of these women have undergone some type of career change, raised families and faced the common adversity that comes with being a successful professional and a committed wife and mother. But all of them have risen to the challenge—and they've all managed to give something back to their communities, too.

Marcia G. Taylor is another keynote speaker who has learned to juggle career, family and civic obligations. Taylor is president and chief executive officer of Bennett International Group, Inc., in McDonough. Taylor and her late husband bought what was then a small trucking business in 1974. The business now comprises 15 business units, all revolving around transportation, with operations in the United States and abroad and an annual revenue of \$170 million.

Taylor has steered the company forward since her husband, J.D. Garrison, died in 1981. Her three grown children have now joined the family business. "There are a lot of good people here,



and we've worked together for a lot of years to pull it together," Taylor said. "We've been able to make it grow."

In addition to running the company, Taylor is on the boards of several organizations and businesses and is active in the National Association of Women Business Owners.
